God Is There; We're Getting There

On occasion you may hear reference to "the Old Testament God" and "the New Testament God" as if they were separate. The God of Israel was characterized as violent and judgmental, while the Christian God was depicted as compassionate and merciful. This is misleading at best and prejudiced at worst. Yahweh of the Hebrew Bible is the same God Jesus called "Father" in the New Testament.

What changed over time was not the nature of God, but our perception of God. We cannot expect believers of 3,000 years ago to express God as we do today or as others will 3,000 years from now. There's an interesting Greek word that applies to this dynamic. It's *kairos*. It means God's *the time*. It's distinct from chronological time, but also intervenes in it.

When God determined, for instance, that it was *the time* for Jesus to enter the world, it was because God judged, in God's inscrutable ways, that chronological time was ready to interact with God's *the time* in this most profound way.


Matthew's Gospel is very concerned with presenting Jesus as the fulfilment of Old Testament expectations, that change does not erase continuity. A sort of repetition is used in the text to reinforce this point. Matthew writes, "At that time Jesus said," "At that time Jesus went," "At that time Herod" (11:25; 12:1; 14:1) None of these are chronological references even though they seem like they should be. They indicate the intrusion of God's extraordinary *the time* into the ordinary time of Jesus' life.

During and ever since the life of Jesus, people of a Christian faith have tried to better understand and relate more profoundly to Jesus. Jaroslav Pelikan, the late Yale professor, wrote the book *Jesus through the Centuries: His Place in the History of Culture*. It's captivating to read how each successive Christian epoch reimagines Jesus so that He is more meaningful in their particular time. We constantly and naturally reimagine God so that God is more approachable. Change is a constant and it does not impair the continuity of *the time*. Actually, it enhances it.

Let's take the recent example of our vote to use the gender-neutral Doxology. The traditional referred to God as Father, Son and Holy Ghost. This gender identification of God reaches back to the Bible's first paragraph when "he" is used as God's pronoun. (Genesis 1:5) Language and culture change, however. *He* was once used to honour God; now many

see gender as limiting God. Thus, we voted to adapt. God didn't change; we did for the sake of continuity.

Another language adaptation that I find interesting is the apparent increased use of the word *equity*. The word *equity* is used fourteen times in the Old Testament, and never in the New! There is a profound difference between *equity* and *equality*. As they say, a picture is worth a thousand words. This is the dif-

Social justice is working more toward equity than equality at present. The traditional Columbus Day, for example, is now just as often referred to as Indigenous Peoples' Day. There is a conscious effort to reflect the neglected but equally noble history of the Native Americans rather than to concentrate almost solely on the European settlers. This is an example of equity, of compensating now for past inequalities.

There's a great deal of pushback to such things as unfair, but this seems to be a liminal moment and change engenders strong reactions. Equity, in a sense, is unfair and it can be resented. Equity treats people according to a desire to achieve equality by striving in the present to redress past inequalities.

We should remember God acts with equity. The New Testament does not use the word equity, but Jesus says, "From everyone to whom much has been given, much will be required; and from one to whom much has been entrusted, even more will be demanded." (Lk 12:48) Jesus' take on equity is not from the one receiving, but from that of the one sharing an advantage.

If we have been blessed with advantages in life, Jesus asks us to act like God acts — with equity. In this way our time may match *the time* of God. As such, we will become more godly, more attuned to the aspirations Jesus sets before us in His life and gospel, and history teaches this takes time — a lot of time, but we can get there.

and COVID treatments have combined Accordingly, the Council encourages for the benefit of those who may be are now optional. The Council will the numbers spike upwards, then we may




to lower the risks of this pandemic virus. those attending in person to wear a facemask immunocompromised, but face coverings continue to monitor the COVID numbers. If
